#### A Swift Summary of Wellbeing Stuff for Funders

April's edition of FundWell is curated by Dom Kelly of New Disabled South

I have been a student and practitioner of <u>disability justice</u> for a long time, and while organizing in movements in and outside of DJ spaces, I have seen firsthand how easy it is for our frontline people to burn out, for our organizations to fall apart, and for our movements to die. At <u>New Disabled South</u>, the organization I founded and lead, we know that the sustainability of our movements, and the wellbeing of our communities, hinges on whether philanthropy aligns with the principles of disability justice. Funding models that prioritize accessibility, leadership of disabled people, sustainability, and long-term infrastructure are key to building stronger, healthier, more resilient movements. In this edition, we're highlighting examples of tools for shifting funding practices toward care for the most impacted and conversation starters to bring these ideas into your organizations. <u>Only 0.1% of philanthropic dollars goes to disability rights and justice work</u>, but if we shift the model for funding to help build resilient movements, we can also see that funding increase.
